Singapore's Catch-All or Relevant Activity

Relevant Activity

The development, production, handling, operation, maintenance, storage, detection, identification or dissemination of any nuclear, chemical, or biological weapon

The development, production, maintenance or storage of missiles which are capable of delivering any such weapon

Permit & Approval for Controlled Export & Transhipment – Regulations of Imports & Export Regulations

Permit for export or transhipment

3.— (1) ... no goods shall be ... exported out of Singapore ... or transshipped in Singapore, except in accordance with a <u>permit granted by the Director-General</u>.

Approval of competent authority


5.— (1) An application for the approval of the competent authority in relation to ... any controlled export or controlled transshipment shall be made <u>before any contract</u> for the ... export or transshipment of the goods <u>has been entered into</u>.



Permits for Transfers – Strategic Goods (Control) Act


Transfer of strategic goods, etc.

- 5.—(2) No person shall —
- (a) export, tranship or bring in transit any goods;
- (b) export any document in which any technology is recorded, stored or embodied; or
- (c) transmit any technology,
- if —
- (i) he has been notified by an authorised officer or a senior authorised officer that the goods or technology is intended or likely to be used, wholly or in part, for or in connection with a relevant activity;
- (ii) he knows that the goods or technology is intended to be used, wholly or in part, for or in connection with a relevant activity; or
- (iii) he has reasonable grounds to suspect that the goods or technology is intended or likely to be used, wholly or in part, for or in connection with a relevant activity.






Singapore's Relevant Activity (or Catch-All) Clause





Relevant Activity (or Catch-All) Control Notification





Relevant Activity (or Catch-All) from Knowledge or Grounds to Suspect

"Knows":

- Relevant activity can be invoked if there is evidence that the company/ person knows that the goods would be intended for a relevant activity
- Requires mens rea for the company/person to be culpable

"Has Reasonable Grounds to Suspect":

- Relevant activity can be invoked if there is evidence showing that the company/person has reasonable grounds to suspect that the goods would be intended for a relevant activity
- Requires proof that company <u>ignores obvious red flags</u>.



Permits For Relevant Activity (or Catch All)

Export

Export of goods and technology known/suspected/been informed to be used for WMD purposes

Transhipment/Transit

Transhipment and transit of goods and technology known/suspected/been informed to be used for WMD purposes

Permits

Brokering

Apply for a brokering permit for relevant activity transactions (known/ suspected/been informed to be used for WMD purposes)

Intangible Transfer of Technology

Apply for a ITT permit for relevant activity transactions (known/suspected/been informed to be used for WMD purposes)



Relevant Activity (or Catch-All) Offences

a) Has been Notified

 Did not take up a requisite permit after being <u>notified</u> to do so

b) Knows

 Did not take up a permit despite knowing that goods would be used for relevant activity

c) Has Reasonable Grounds to Suspect

Did not take up a
 permit despite having
 grounds to suspect
 that goods would be
 used for relevant
 activity



Seizure & Forfeiture - Strategic Goods (Control) Act

Power to seize and remove

16.— (3) The authorised officer or senior authorised officer may seize and remove any article or document in respect of which he has <u>reasonable cause for believing</u> that an offence under section 5 or 6 has been or is being or is about to be committed.

Forfeiture

17. —(1) A court may order that anything shown to the court's satisfaction to be the subject-matter of an offence under section 5 or 6 or to have been <u>used in the commission of such an offence</u> shall be forfeited to the Government, and either destroyed or otherwise dealt with in such manner as the court may order.



Penalties for Offences (SGCA)

1st Conviction (per count)

- Fine for up to \$100,000 or 3 times the value of the goods whichever is higher; or
- Imprisonment for up to 2 years; or
- Both

2nd or Subsequent Conviction (per count)

- Fine for up to \$200,000 or 4 times the value of the goods whichever is higher; or
- Imprisonment for up to 3 years; or
- Both



Best Practices - Relevant Activity Compliance

Always screen customers and end-users against denied or Screen sanctioned parties lists prior to each sale for WMD proliferation risk. **Enquire** • When in doubt, **enquire** more **details on the end use** of the items. **Assess** • Assess the sale transaction for WMD proliferation risk. • Inform Customs if you know or suspect that your items may be or Inform likely to be used for relevant activity. • **Submit** to Customs either an **application to seek preliminary Submit** advice on strategic goods transaction or a permit application for relevant activity.



Best Practices - Relevant Activity Compliance

Gather information about the shipment



- Consignee details
- Information on intermediaries
- Delivery information
- Item description & details (model/ CASRN, etc)
- Technical specifications

 Include information or explanation on why you suspect that the shipment may be intended for relevant activity end-use.
